Chamber Supports Use Tax

The City of Richmond will place a question regarding the implementation of a Local Use Tax on the April 2, 2013 General Election Ballot. The local use tax would be applied, in lieu of local sales tax, on transactions that individuals and businesses conduct with out of state vendors, including catalog, internet, and direct market sales. Sales tax is currently not collected on the types of transactions listed. The City of Richmond will soon be sending out information explaining the Use Tax, how it is collected, and what it would be used for. The information will also address why we need a Use Tax. The Richmond Area Chamber Board of Directors and The Richmond Downtown District Committee have both decided unanimously to fully support the efforts of passing the Use Tax. A Use Tax informational brochure is available at Richmond City Hall and the Chamber office.
